Most of Muzu's paintings are inspired by his love of Zanzibar. They evoke a sense of the exotic and transport the viewer into a dream-like state, a world of poetry in stone, brought out by his very clever use of light, shadow and shade. His water colours depicting scenes in and around Dar es Salaam are beautiful in their composition attention to detail; in some, an old cathedral, church of other beautiful buildings is highlighted.
